* From the Pastor's Pen

Grace, peace, and joy to you in the name of Jesus Christ, our coming King and our ever-present Lord. Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

As we enter December, our hearts are drawn once again to the holy season of Advent, a season of longing, preparation, and deep hope. Advent invites us to slow down, to breathe, and to remember that the God who came to us in Bethlehem still comes to us today. He enters our world not in spectacle, but in the quiet places where we wait, pray, and listen for His voice. For many of us, this year has brought joys, challenges, unexpected turns, and the need for healing; physical, emotional, and relational. Yet in all of it, Christ has walked faithfully beside us, reminding us that we do not journey alone.

In the glow of the Advent candles, we remember that Christ came into a world much like ours, full of turmoil, uncertainty, and longing. He came as Light in the darkness, Peace in the storm, and Hope for weary hearts. And just as He came then, He comes now: into our church, our homes, our families, and into every place where His people call upon His name. Whether gathered in worship or scattered across the routines and travels of daily life, we remain His people, bearers of His presence and witnesses to His grace wherever we go.

This December, I want to invite you to approach the manger not only with awe, but with expectation. Christ is not done with us. He is forming us, healing us, uniting us, and preparing us for the work of His Kingdom in the year to come. Advent reminds us that God is not a distant observer of our story; He is its Author and its Redeemer. He steps into the real places of our lives, our questions, our hurts, our hopes, our searching, and whispers, "Do not be afraid, for I am with you."

As we look toward a new year, let us carry with us the lessons of this one:

- That Christ heals what we cannot heal on our own.
- That unity, forgiveness, and love are the marks of His people.
- That wherever we go, far from home or no farther than the next aisle in the grocery store, we go as His ambassadors.
- That the light of Christ shines most brightly through ordinary acts of kindness, courage, and faithfulness.

Advent points us forward, to the day when Christ will come again in glory, and to the day that is already dawning in our hearts as we surrender ourselves more fully to Him. No matter what this past year has held, or what the next may bring, we can walk with confidence because Christ walks with us. The One who came as a child now reigns as King, and He calls us to follow Him into a new year of mission, discipleship, and hope.

May His hope steady your steps.


And may His calling lead us as a church into a year marked by faith, unity, and joy.

Blessings for December, All!

As you read this, the Suntisouk Language and Vocational Center, of which I am director, is gearing up for our English language Christmas units.

Teachers Shaloom (Global Mission Fellow's intern from Pakistan), Santi (local native, teaching the ABC beginners) and myself have come up with three days of culture lessons. First

will be the religious focus and second will be the traditional. The capital city has already exploded in Christmas trees, lights, carols played in malls, Santa hats, and holiday clothing for all ages. Our students have no clue what the holiday means, mostly as this is a predominantly Buddhist and animasts (worship of spirits) country. They just like the excitement of it all.

Here at the Center, I consider it my task as a Christian and an educator to carefully inform, especially when students are surrounded by the visuals of the holiday but ignorant as to the meaning. After the classroom lessons, our holiday unit will come together for our Deck the Halls Activity Night on December 4. Students, their siblings, parents and invited friends, will gather in the main hall, where our lighted trees await them. Like last year, we'll have stations with various decorating tasks outlined for students to enjoy: Christmas tree ornament making, creating paper rope chains, and cutting out snowflakes. They can place their decorations wherever they wish, even taking some home if they'd like.

I'm adding gift wrapping this year.

Students will be wrapping, tagging and giving as gifts red apples. The Christmas apple is a holiday symbol for Santa Claus, coming from the Alsace region which is located in northeastern France. What better way to help students understand our Christian giving spirit than for them to participate as giftgivers themselves. Each student will be preparing 3 apples: one for a school teacher, one for a relative and one for a friend. I'm expecting more than 50 participating, which means purchasing quite a lot of supplies. Apples, by the way, are not cheap in Laos as they are imported from Chin and Thailand.

Those of you who have contributed to the Center in the past, by giving to the church office to send in for the Center's Advance # 3021548, has led me to be able to truly go all-out for Christmas this year. I've calculated \$310 for our 2025 celebrations, which will include ordering 200 apples through a local market seller. If you'd like to help replenish that fund for 2026, please feel free to ask the church office the procedure needed. (There's a recent list of Center expenses posted in the church, including the cost of re-roofing the main hall.)

Thank you, thank you, thank you for all your prayers and financial support over the years as we partner together in this vital overseas mission.

May the joy of Jesus' birth renew your spirit and God's love shine upon you as you have so graciously shone God's love upon me.

Midwest Mission responds to Hurricane Melissa

You can join Midwest Mission as 25,000 meals are packed to feed 150,000 people in Jamaica.

When Hurricane Melissa — a Category 5 storm — made landfall in Jamaica Oct. 28, it left behind devastation: flooded communities, destroyed homes, and power outages across the island.

Midwest Mission's partners at Food for the Poor are on the ground and have shared that food is the greatest need right now.

Midwest Mission is responding by sending a container of Rice and Soy Blessing Bags to Jamaica — enough to feed 150,000 people.

You Can Help by donating to supply Blessing Bags. Each Blessing Bag meal costs just \$2 and feeds 6 people. Every dollar helps. \$24 feeds 72 people; \$50 feeds 150 people; \$150 feeds 450 people; and \$300 feeds 900!

In addition to specific ministry giving, we as a United Methodist congregation give to support a portion of the Conference budget, which includes ministries in Illinois, the United States, and the world. These ministries include things such as youth camps, pastoral training, health and welfare agencies, scholarships, our Conference staff (superintendent, Rev. Sara Isbell, and our bishops) here in Illinois, world missions such as United Methodist Committee on Relief, missionaries such as our own Connie Weick, Africa University, AIDS medications in Africa, and many more too numerous to name. The Conference has asked that our local church contribute \$31,956 for the year. Thus far, we

have given \$15,206, leaving **\$16,750** that we would still like to send to support the mission and ministries of the United Methodist Church. Please prayerfully consider what the Lord would have you give toward apportionments in addition to your regular tithes and offerings and special end of year gifts.
