

Grace and peace to you in the name of Jesus Christ, our Good Shepherd, who makes us lie down in green pastures and leads us beside still waters.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

August stands at the threshold between seasons. The summer heat lingers, yet we begin to sense the nearness of fall—the return of school, shifting schedules, and the gentle tug of routine reasserting itself. Some of us are still holding onto vacation plans or time with family, while others are already gearing up for what comes next. But before we rush forward. I want to offer an invitation: take a breath, slow your steps, and let the Lord lead you beside still waters.

Psalm 23 reminds us that it is our Shepherd who leads us to rest. Not the world. Not our calendars. Not our own attempts to earn peace. The still waters are not a luxury we chase but a gift God gives. And I don't know about you, but it seems that in our world—no matter the season—rest is in short supply. Even in summer, when things are supposed to slow down, we often fill our lives with so much activity that we never quite feel rested.

There's a weariness that goes beyond the body—a soul-deep tiredness that can settle in when we carry burdens too long or run on empty too often. Jesus speaks directly to that in Matthew 11:28–30: "Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest... you will find rest for your souls."

This isn't rest like the world gives. It's not just a day off or a nap in the shade (though both are good). It's the kind of rest that renews the inner person, quiets anxious thoughts, and reminds us that we are held in the hands of a faithful God. It's the kind of rest that comes when we trust the Shepherd more than we trust ourselves.

This kind of rest doesn't mean passivity—it means trusting that God is God and we are not. It means letting go of the burdens we were never meant to carry alone. It means sitting quietly in prayer, letting Scripture speak to your soul, taking time to breathe deeply of God's grace, and remembering that you are His beloved child.

As we prepare for the new season ahead—back-to-school, harvest time, and the return to many of our regular ministries—I encourage you to allow this month to be a holy pause. Let God restore your soul. Take intentional time to dwell in His presence, to seek Him not for what He can do, but simply because of who He is.

The world demands urgency. God invites us into peace. The enemy whispers "you must do more." But the Spirit says, "Be still and know that I am God." (Psalm 46:10)

Let us be a people who know what it means to rest in Him. Let us be a church marked not by weariness but by quiet strength, drawn from the still waters of grace. And when we rise again to work for His Kingdom, let it be from a place of wholeness and joy.

In the peace and rest of Christ Jesus, may it be so,



Sabaidi (Hello!) from Laos via Marshall!

My mom, Priscilla Wieck, has been emailing me all summer with this reminder: "Did you tell our MarshallUMC you were coming back in August for a visit?"

Here it is now!

Missionaries receive 1 month yearly vacations, however we want to take them, if approved by our regionalarea secretary. I was approved for July 29 - August 29 so you'll be seeing me around Marshall and, ofcourse, in church.

Closing ceremonies for our students took place last Thursday. If you follow my Facebook page (ConnieWieck) or my website (**connieinchina.org**), you'll see all the pictures and stories. My Facebook page andwebsite announce the country I am in but I never refer to myself as a missionary, only a teacher. This isquite an interesting placement, one of the few we United Methodists have that are deemed a "sensitivearea". Our denomination is not recognized by the government so we are very careful at worship centerswith our local United Methodist Christians to be just "community centers", not advertised as churches.

I am in charge of the business end, running the Suntisouk Language and Vocational Center in the city with English language courses offered in the evenings. This is how we get fulltime missionaries into the country. Officially, we are hired on work visas to be teachers at the Center but some actually are not here nor teach English. I do as I'm the director and teaching English as a second language is my profession. However, ournew country director, David, works with churches which have been established under our denomination, does pastoral training, oversees all the workings of our planted churches here and is also in charge of all thefinances. His wife, Sora, is creating and putting into practice the Sunday School program for children. That's a huge project. She has also been training the teachers taking on this task. This is a mini-pilotprogram at first and will later be perfected, then materials compiled, workshops for teachers in outerlyingareas and hopefully, it will be offthe ground for young kids by next year. We also have our Global Mission Fellow (GMF) here, a 2-year position. The GMF program is for youngChristians, ages 20 - 30, who want to serve the world's people in some specialy way. Our GMF is Shaloomand he's from Pakistan. I am his supervisor and mentor, which is a true blessing. He has fit so nicely into our community. He gives amazing prayers during our weekly meetings. He also has settled into his teachingrole very well. I have him only for another year and then offhe goes. If anyone is interested, I can talk toyou more about this amazing program sponsored by our United Methodist Global Ministries.

In Closing

I have gone on long enough. I have so many stories to share and many, many joys in serving here. Catch meat church for more opportunities to hear how your generous support of me over these many years has trulymade a difference in bringing others an understanding of God's love and what it means to be a follower of Jesus.

Update From UMCOR (United Methodist Committee On Relief)

Often, to facilitate relief procedures, UMCOR partners with existing relief organizations in the area of need, for logistical reasons. Currently UMCOR is partnering with the IOCC (International Orthodox Christian Charities) to bring much needed food and water to Palestinian families in a refugee and displacement camp where they are living in tents.

IOCC also partners with a local youth group organization who contracts a local commercial kitchen to cook and package hot meals for the camp. A food distribution coordinator and chefs are recruited to oversee the operation which serves almost 4,000 displaced people daily who come to the food site.

Food aid is also provided from food boxes generally containing flour, legumes and cooking oil. However, often displaced families have no way to cook food and they lack clean water. By using a commercial kitchen, families can come to an organized, safe place in their displacement camp to eat or pick up food.

This method also provides work and income for local host country workers. The partnership has proved so successful that UMCOR has pledged to double its support. UMCOR is in need of funds so that the feeding program can continue to serve even more displaced families.

The Food and Clothing Distribution Center is always in need of funds. This winter is going to be a difficult one for many families. Federal funds are gradually being reduced .We who have so much are called upon to help those who are in need.
