Evading collisions. Dodging potholes. Plowing through dust clouds.

Early Sunday morning, I zip along the city and countryside roads on my way to church. The 35-minute journey on my midnight blue motor scooter is a long and challenging one but the 2-hour worship service and lunch afterwards with my newfound brothers and sisters in Christ is the reward. And what a joyful reward it is.

If you've been checking my website, connieinchina.org, you'll be updated on all my activities. If not, as a reminder, I accepted a new position through our United Methodist Global Ministries which places me as director of the Suntisouk Language and Vocational Center (SLVC), located in Vientian City in Southeast Asia. The Center was created 7 years ago as a UM Global Ministries mission initiative outreach to others in this country.

There is a staff of 7 local people and 3 full-time Methodist missionaries. It has numerous free and fee-paying courses for all ages to help with the low educational level of the people. It also helps pastors' and lay-leaders' children with their educational needs. School uniforms, fees, books, and supplies run \$35 to \$50 per child per year. Church leaders are usually farmers or village shopkeepers. Giving by church members is low or nothing at all, meaning there is no regular salary for the vital task these faithful individuals have taken on to bring the Good News to others. When the Center can relieve such burdens, it's a great blessing.

#### **Center Funding Greatly Needed.**

When I landed in December, I was told the Center's annual budget is \$12,000 but for 2023, the Center's overseas church giving was not enough. It is currently \$4,000 in the red. My goal as director is to get us out of debt and off to a strong 2024 start by the summer. This will not only allow continuation of programs already established but, will enable new project ideas (of which I have many!) to be implemented.

In December, our Marshall UWF gave generously to the Center's Advance #3021548, which added greatly to diminishing that \$4,000 debt. If anyone else is interested with financial giving, ask my mom, Priscilla Wieck, and she'll steer you in the right direction.

As always, thank you for your continued prayers and support. Here's hoping your potholes are few and your spirits are high as you journey to worship every Sunday.

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ

January has passed, and although Walmart has had Valentine items in the store since two days before Christmas, we have finally arrived in the month when love is in the air. Both Christians and non-Christians alike celebrate February 14 as a day of love. For most, it is the love of men and women for one another. The card companies have made a lot of money promoting this holiday, and it got me to wondering what it is all about. Who is (or who was) this Saint Valentine?

St. Valentine was a priest near Rome in about the year 270 A.D. during the days of Claudius the Cruel." Marriage was forbidden, as men were unwilling to go to war leaving their wives, families, or fiancées.

Valentine believed that God's, plan was for men and women to marry, rather than live in the immoral ways of the people of his day. Thus, Valentine honored God by marrying Christian couples in secret, which enraged the emperor, who ordered his arrest. During his interrogation, he was asked what he thought of the roman gods. Saint Valentine said that they were false gods, and that the only true God was the God who is the Father of the Lord Jesus Christ. This being his answer, he was put in prison. While in prison, Valentine continued to minister. He witnessed to the guards. One of the guards was a good man who had adopted a blind girl. He asked Valentine if his God could help the man's daughter. Valentine prayed and the girl was given her sight. The guard and his whole family of 46 people believed in Jesus and were baptized.

Because these people had come to know Jesus, Valentine praised God right there in his prison cell. When the emperor heard about this, he was furious that Valentine was still making converts even in prison, so he had Valentine beheaded on February 14th, Valentine gave his life for the cause of Christ heeding our Lords example and words, "Greater love has no one than this, than to lay down one's life for his friends." (John 15:13 NKJV) St. Valentine laid down his life that others might honor God with their lives, and that many more might come to know the saving knowledge of Jesus Christ.

Valentine knew what it meant to live out the great commandment which Jesus said fulfilled all of the teaching of the Law and the Prophets, ... You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind" ... (and) "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." (Matthew 22:37-39 NKJV) This is the kind of love we are to have: a love that surpasses all others; it is the essence of Christianity. This is what Valentine's Day is truly all about.

This year Ash Wednesday falls on Valentine's Day, and the two somehow don't seem to go together. Why? Because our modern-day celebration of Valentine's Day seems to be marked by overindulgence while Ash Wednesday begins a season of self-denial. How do we reconcile the two? As I think about it, Valentine's Day is about human love, the love of a man and a woman, seen most fully in the God-ordained bond of Christian marriage. Ash Wednesday is also about love, our love for God and God's love for us. We deny ourselves as an act of love toward God, and thus build our love relationship with God. What a beautiful picture Ash Wednesday on Valentine's Day truly is. Valentine, a priest of the one true God, out of love for Christ and others was willing to sacrifice even his freedom for the sake of his love for God and the people God called him to serve.

This Ash Wednesday/Valentine's Day may your love for God and the people He has placed in your life lead you to greater devotion to God and those He has called you to love.

### **Eucharistic Lay Ministers**

Marshall Ministerial Alliance Food Distribution and Clothing Store needs your help!

A large number of Clark County residents receive free food at our local food pantry each month.

This can only be provided if the community supports Marshall Ministerial Alliance Food Distribution and Clothing Store with both monetary donations, donations to the clothing store, & especially volunteer time.



This organization has two components-the food pantry & the clothing store. Both are entirely volunteer run and are governed by a volunteer Board of Directors. The board president is always one of Marshall's ministers, currently Pastor John Cross. Gil Wright is the Executive Director.

Funding for the pantry's operations comes from monetary donations, donations of items, and clothing store income. Most of the food is purchased at a substantial discount from Eastern Illinois Food Bank. Clients may receive food one time per month, and food is distributed each Tuesday afternoon. The fourth Tuesday of each month is the "big food day" at which most clients come for their food.

Revenue from the clothing store is the main funding source for food purchases. Donated clothing, accessories, toys, household items, and much more are sold in the store at affordable prices. Items that are not sellable are either taken to the Good Will or discarded. The clothing store is open Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday from 9:00 to 11:45 AM.

The organization fills other local needs as well, such as when a home burns, a child comes to school ill-clothed, families become homeless, and more. Assistance is also given to the local backpack food programs. Due the Burnsides Nursing Home board's very large donation, a much larger building is now being erected in the south end of Marshall. This will provide much-needed space that will allow the food distribution and clothing store to have separate working spaces and storage. The move to the new building will require many hands and strong backs.

*Volunteers are needed:* 

- in the clothing store from 8:30 AM to Noon on Monday, Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday mornings. Volunteers sort, hang, and price donations, arrange shelves and racks, man the sales desk, advertise items online, and haul. Our church is responsible for manning the store every third Saturday morning.

- for food distribution each Tuesday afternoon. Volunteers set up the room, bag the food, check clients in, push shopping carts, and then clean up. Fourth Tuesday hours are 12 noon to 4:30 PM; other Tuesdays are 1:30 to 4:00 PM.

There are a variety of jobs that anyone can do, and a person is welcome to come at any of the above times. If you are interested in being the hands of Christ, please join us, or contact Nancy Claypool or Jo Sanders for more information.



In 2012 the United Methodist General Conference voted to add a paragraph to our Book of Discipline. The paragraph encourages pastors to select and train laypersons to take Communion to those who are unable to be present for the congregation's sharing of the bread and cup. This is part of the congregational care of members and friends who while unable to attend the public worship of God, are still in need of the sacramental grace EUCHARISTIC offered in the fellowship of the body of Christ around His table.

Before COVID, Marshall First had a group of dedicated Lay people who assisted the pastor in delivering communion to those who were unwillingly absent from congregational worship due to illness, disability, or advanced age. This was stopped during COVID and never restarted.

As your Pastor and with the encouragement of the Book of Discipline and with the need and desire of some of our members, I believe this vital ministry needs to be restarted in order to offer the best congregational care to our most vulnerable members.

#### What would this ministry entail?

The elements from the congregation's celebration of the Lord's Supper would be gathered by those willing servants and delivered to those who are prevented from regularly attending public worship.

A short liturgy will be shared between the Eucharistic Lay Minister and those they visit, taking into consideration the health and abilities of the communicants who are to receive the elements.

Since the bread and wine have already been blessed by a United Methodist Elder, that part of the liturgy is omitted. The service should be long enough not to feel rushed but short enough to not over-tax the capacity of the ones who are being ministered to. What is crucial is that in every instance the service with the unwillingly absent be seen as an extension of the congregation's fellowship around the Lord's Table, not as something independent of it.

If the Lord is calling you to be a part of this vital ministry, please contact me and I will provide the needed training.

I look forward to working with you to extend the worship of Christ to those who are unwillingly absent from our worship services.

\* The term "Eucharist" originates from the Greek word eucharistia, meaning thanksgiving. It is a term used for the sacrament of Holy Communion.
