## How far is too far?

Our recently concluded General Conference for the United Methodist Church left me scratching my head, asking the age-old question, "How far is too far?" I'm pretty sure, at least judging from the number of emails and letters I am receiving, a few other folks are struggling with the same question, "Has the United Methodist Church gone too far?" ΩA The decisions of this General Conference, more than any General Conference of the past 40 years, were filled with sweeping changes. A few of these changes have significant theological implications for the future of The United Methodist Church.

The goals set for this General Conference were concrete, concise, and clear. These goals were anchored by a well-rehearsed and rehashed mantra that was restated throughout the two weeks and became known as the "Three R's." The three Rs were **Regionalization**, **Revise**, and **Removal**. The delegates for this General Conference walked in locked-step and marched to victory by voting overwhelmingly to move the denomination into regionalization, a revision of the Social Principles, and the removal of all restrictive language about LGBTQ people. Most of the changes were long overdue, but a few of the decisions left many, including me, wondering if the delegates went too far.

I applaud the move toward regionalization because it continues the work of tearing down an intentionally racist system that was imposed on the denomination's black members when the General Conference voted to separate the United States into jurisdictions. One jurisdiction, called the "Central Jurisdiction," was created and composed of all the black churches throughout the United States, while five other geographic areas were created for the white members. In the most recent merger, 1968, the Central Jurisdiction was dismantled but the racist framework was kept intact.

The Social Principles should always be nimble and adaptive, BUT they must also reflect who we are biblically. Our social witness must be clearly anchored and held in place by adherence to the personal life examples and the teachings given to us by Jesus Christ. Only time will tell if the decisions made by this General Conference went too far.

I applaud the removal of restrictive language from our Book of Discipline. ALL SIN is incompatible with Christian teaching. No sin should be singled out and cited as being "the sin" that is highlighted with its own hurtful citations.

The question, "How far is too far?" is raised because I believe there are some lines that we do not have the luxury of crossing, even with the goals of love, liberation, and liberty. The church of Jesus Christ should never be guilty of promoting or accepting sin of any kind. A careful reading of some of the things that were removed from our Book of Discipline left me scratching my head and wondering if we went a bit too far.

I am trying not to rush toward judgement or to make decisions that are premature. I want to see what all this restructuring will look like when the dust settles. Construction is messy and sometimes you must wait for the paving to be finished and allow the cones to be removed. My question is, will we actually reach people with the good news of the gospel of Jesus Christ or is all of this just a smoke screen that flings the door open wider for folks to do, with the church's blessing, whatever they want to do? Only time will tell if this General Conference went too far. My hope and prayer is that we did not violate the boundaries that please Jesus Christ.

These are days of challenge and change. A seismic shift is occurring throughout the world and within the body of Christ. There is no place that is safe from this storm, other than the arms of Jesus. Change is happening all around us. The church cannot afford to become intoxicated with its own juice and end up like Rip Van Winkle asleep, while the world around us changes.

Neither can we afford the luxury of remaining cloistered behind stained-glass windows. Jesus calls his followers to set the standards for the world and not to cave into the standards set by the world. Jesus Christ is our foundation. He alone is the standard we are called to emulate. All other ground, no matter how good it looks, is sinking sand.

I love The United Methodist Church and my prayers for more than 50 years are focused on restoration, renewal, and revival. Did this General Conference help move us toward revitalization, or did we go too far?

# Bishop Beard to go on long-term disability

SPRINGFIELD – Bishop Frank J. Beard announced June 11 that he has been approved for long-term disability due to his ongoing battle with glaucoma.

In a letter to the North Central Jurisdictional College of Bishops Secretary, Lanette Plambeck, Bishop Beard requested to be relieved from the performance of all regular episcopal duties, effective Aug. 1. Under the Wespath Comprehensive Protection Plan, long-term disability can span up to 34 months, at which time Bishop Beard would either return to active service or retire from the episcopacy.

"My ongoing battle with glaucoma has caused me to become legally blind," Bishop Beard wrote, in which copies were also sent to the Dr. Barrie Tritle, chair of the NCJ Committee on Episcopacy and Bishop Tracy Smith Malone, president of the Council of Bishops. "It has been a very difficult decision for me and my family, but we believe that the Lord will continue to direct our paths and guide us through this season of challenge and change."

As a result of Bishop Beard's notification, the NCJ College of Bishops will share the information with the NCJ Committee of Episcopacy and after an affirmative vote, the final approval will come from the executive committee of the Council of Bishops. The Council of Bishops will then assign an interim Bishop to cover the episcopal area.

The Council of Bishops could assign a retired bishop in the interim or could select an active bishop who would assume additional responsibilities in the Illinois Area as well as their episcopal area. The latter course of action was taken in July 2021 when Bishop Beard went on short-term disability for six months and Bishop Gregory Vaughn Palmer was assigned to the Illinois Area in addition to West Ohio.

Bishop Beard was elected to the episcopacy in 2016 and is completing his second quadrennium of service with the Illinois Great Rivers Conference. The 2024 Jurisdictional Conference will be held July 10-13 in Sioux Falls, S.D., where episcopal assignments are announced for the new guadrennium, beginning Sept. 1 by the NCJ Committee on Episcopacy. Bishop Beard had served two guadrennia in the Illinois Area, but a disciplinary provision enables bishops to serve a third guadrennium in an episcopal area for missional reasons. Bishop Beard was scheduled to retire in 2028.

Bard, Bishop Kennetha Bigham-Tsai, Bishop Hee-Soo Jung, Bishop Tracy S. Malone, Bishop Lanette Plambeck, and Bishop Dan Schwerin, along with the possibility of a retired Bishop coming in on an interim basis.
