- *10 dollars will provide a blanket to someone in need.
- *25 dollars will provide a blanket and a hygiene kit with essential supplies.
- *60 dollars will provide a family bundle that includes blankets and hygiene kits for an entire family.

You can leave your contribution in the offering plate envelopes or in the church office. Be sure to designate CWS Blankets. Checks should be made out to FUMC, not to CWS directly. Our church treasurer will send your donations after the first of March to Church World Service.

As you know, as of 2/1/25 shifted to a designated giving method of providing those funds to the Illinois Great Rivers Conference. Our apportionment bill for 2025 is \$31,956.00, or \$2663.00 per month. The month of January was paid in full prior to this decision. To date, \$550 in designated giving has been donated to our apportionment bill. That leaves \$2113.00 for the month of February that needs to be paid, or \$31,406.00 for the year. If you would like to designate giving to apportionments, you may do so by writing in the memo section, checking the box on the envelope, or online. You may also designate to connectional ministries, if you so choose.

From the Pastor's Pen

Grace, peace, and joy to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ, in the power of the Holy Spirit. Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Recently, I had a conversation with a member of our congregation who asked me a very important question that left me in deep thought and prayer. The question, "Pastor, what do we need?" Now, why would that question affect me in such a way? Because we are going through a painful season in our congregation. Many of our congregation have decided to leave the church due to our inability to determine our denominal affiliation. This has caused pain and hurt on all sides of the issue. Many of our number are experiencing all the stages of grief, denial, anger, bargaining, depression and acceptance.

For some time, we have been in the stage of <u>denial</u>, thinking that everyone would just get over it and get back to the way we were. Some, like me, have been stuck in the stage of <u>bargaining</u>, trying to find a way for everyone to stay in our local congregation even though many are angry at the actions of the denomination we are a part of. For some, the bargains we have made are enough; but for others there is no bargain to make. I have spent significant time with members who are in the stage of <u>depression</u> and profound sadness for the loss of peace and relationship we have experienced and are continuing to experience. Still others are just <u>angry</u>, and as with other instances of grief, some of our number are choosing to lash out in anger to others, only compounding the problem we are dealing with.

Over 32 years of pastoral ministry I have cared for many people who were experiencing grief, and have worked to help them move through their grief to hope. This is not easy when you are a caregiver who is ministering from the outside of grief, but it is even harder when you are dealing with your own. So, let's just accept the fact that as a church and as a denomination, we are experiencing grief for the loss of many of our brothers and sisters in Christ from our fellowship, and seek not to simply, "get over it", but to move forward in a new reality and seek God's direction for fulfilling our mission to make disciples of Jesus Christ.

That brings us back to the question I was asked by a sad church member, "Pastor, what do we need?"

• We need to stop treating each other as the enemy and begin to operate in Christian love for one another again.

The Apostle Paul exhorted the Ephesians to "Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace, by being completely humble, gentle, and patient, bearing with one another in love." For a while now I have experienced and have heard reports of members of our church family mistreating each other with distain, carelessness, and cutting words. This has to stop! We must repent and begin to care once again and begin to treat one another with the love of Christ once again.

 We need to recommit ourselves and our church to our faith through prayer, bible study, intentional relationship building, and outreach to those who need to experience the salvation Christ alone supplies.

When Joshua was about to take over the leadership of Israel, God gave him this instruction, "Study this Book of Instruction continually. Meditate on it day and night so you will be sure to obey everything written in it. Only then will you prosper and succeed in all you do." Our faith must be grounded in the word of God. The Bible is our guide and rule of faith; everything else will fall into place. Scriptural Christianity is attractive. If we lift up Christ and His word, then people will be drawn to a relationship with Him and His church.

We need to open ourselves up to a fresh move of the Holy Spirit.

Many in main line churches are uncomfortable with the work of the Holy Spirit. We don't mind acknowledging the Holy Spirit as a concept, but allowing Him to transform us is a whole other story. The Holy Spirit is not just a concept. He is not a vague feel-good idea that thinks like we think and likes what we like. He is the third person of the Trinity, God active in our lives. As Christians we are to be ruled by the Holy Spirit, allowing Him to examine our whole being and mold us to His control.

We must surrender to Him with our whole beings and allow him to transform us. Romans 12:2 "Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is—His good, pleasing and perfect will." NIV

In just a few days we will enter the Lenten season. It is my prayer that we can begin to move toward the future God has for us, that we can move from a place of grief to hope, and to a true fresh move of the Holy Spirit. But it is going to take intentional surrender to Christ and His word. If we do this, God will bring healing and a new mission for the sake of the Kingdom of God.


