I'm sitting here with our treasurer, Nang Nyai, who is proudly showing me the accumulation of funds coming in from the Advance for the Suntisouk Language and Vocational Center. With Marshall First UMC's sizable \$2,800, we are now able to start up the school year with a whole lot of "Amen!"s and "Hallelujah!"s.

Let me tell you how your generous giving is currently being used.

I recently hired a full-time caretaker of the Center for \$70 a month, a total of \$840 per year. Suher lives at the Center, in one of the empty classrooms. This income is now

helping him support his mother in the countryside and his brother, now attending college. He is also an active member of our Laos UMC praise team.

The Center enrollment is increasing! From September onward, we will be using more classrooms, which means more tables. I ordered 12 tables (\$60 each) and 1 metal cabinet (\$120) for textbook storage. These are being delivered the first week of September.

Celebrating my Laos staff's special events is important. The 7 here have families to support and many weekly church activities to lead, meaning they are very busy. To make our time together special, I celebrate birthdays (cake and outside meal), family members' special news (births, weddings, children's high test scores) and overcoming illness or financial difficulties. Having your funds available for planned or last-minute happenings is such a boost to our spirits.

Lastly, upkeep of the Center is paramount in keeping our students and ourselves safe. This is an old building complex that we rent. We are plagued by roof and ceiling repairs, leaking faucets, and electrical issues. With money readily available, there is no need for us to delay in taking care such things.

While you may never visit Laos, know that support for myself and the staff here through your Advance dollars is making a huge difference in our lives and our service to the Lord.

October 2024 From the Pastor's Pen

Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ in the power and presence of the Holy Spirit.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As many of you know, I like to garden. Admittedly I am not all that good at it, but I find it interesting, relaxing, and satisfying when it all goes right, and I can enjoy the produce coming from plants that I planted and nurtured. But as with most things in life, no matter what method you use, gardening is not easy, it takes work and is not always successful. This year I did not get to plant everything I wanted to and even with a high tunnel greenhouse to protect my plants the pest pressure was extreme. Just when I thought I had dealt with one pest well and got my plants growing again, another would come along in full attack mode, and my plants would suffer a set back again. Just this last week I had finally found the magic formula, the pests where all gone, and I had an abundance of produce getting ready for harvest. But as you know, we had high winds, and my greenhouse took a direct hit. There I stood, assessing the damage, and wondering if I would ever get a break. It was in that moment that I was reminded of what I tell Becky all the time about my garden, "It is all an experiment" I will learn from this too. Becky and I then began to think of all the possibilities of how we could make the greenhouse and our growing systems better so that Grandpa's Garden could live up to its potential.

The truth is all the events, all the joyful and difficult situations of life, can be looked at through the lens of pessimism and defeat or they can be looked at with the lens of "what can I learn from this situation in order to make my life and the lives around me better, as I seek to bring glory and honor to God."

Recently, I watched a video about the giant sequoia tree. The tree is planted from the seeds inside a two-inch pinecone. There is a problem though, the little pinecone will only fulfill its potential through fire. The pinecone takes two years to mature and then waits for a forest fire. The fire melts the resin, releasing the seeds and allowing them to be planted in the ground with the potential of growing to three hundred feet tall and producing thousands of pinecones over its 5000 year life. With fire comes growth, sure for a while it looks like the price is too high, but without the fire growth simply won't come.

Our church is currently going through the fire. We are in conflict; it is tempting to simply give up and quit. We think why did this have to happen in our church? Why can't we just go back to the way we were? Conflict is a fact of life. Each of us deal with little conflicts daily. Some are so small that we just laugh them off and say O well. Others are big and thorny and we say, "I don't want to even think about it." But when we don't deal with conflict it doesn't just go away. It burns under the surface waiting to break out again. It is much the same way with fire. An unharnessed fire is a danger, while a harnessed fire is productive.

This present conflict has the potential to tear the church apart, while at the same time it has the potential to help us grow in our relationships with one another and with God. This church has great potential, but the only way we come through the conflict intact and fruitful for the Kingdom of God is if we begin to grow in the fruit of the Spirit, treating one another with love and mutual respect, realizing that disagreement does not have to tear us apart. The apostle Paul puts it this way, "as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience." If we are willing to "clothe" ourselves in this manner we will build relationships with each other instead of tearing each other down. In James 1:2-4 we read, "Count it all joy, my brothers, when you meet trials of various kinds, for you know that the testing of your faith produces steadfastness. And let steadfastness have its full effect, that you may be perfect and complete, lacking in nothing."




October Mission-Lessie Bates Davis Neighborhood House

Lessie Bates Davis Neighborhood House ,located in East St Louis, is an outreach mission supported by the United Methodist Church. The agency is registered as a multipurpose faith-based community center.


Its stated mission is "to empower individuals and families to move out of poverty in order to achieve self-sufficiency." A summary of some of the many services provided by Lessie Bates (as it is affectionally called) are listed here:

- 1. Early childhood intervention programs through the Family Resource Center including childcare facilities.
- 2. Early childhood education for children ages 3 through pre-kindergarten.
- 3. After school services with youth development programs to help to at risk youth from age 6 to 17.
- 4. Job readiness and job placement services including computer lab access.
- 5. Senior services including a food pantry, Meals on Wheels and a fairly priced cafe and gathering place.
- 6. Sponsor of Americorps Volunteers (the domestic Peace Corps).
- 7. Family support services including counseling, emergency cash availability for help with utility, rental and medical needs and clothing and shelter assistance.
- 8. This past year Lessie Bates has provided services to 15,000 residents in the area. It's outreach has impacted 350 families enrolled in its pre-kindergarten programs. 1,000 meals weekly are provided to seniors. 150 youth are provided employment.


